


Ghost Boys by Jewell Parker Rhodes


Clean Getaway by Nic Stone












King and the Dragonflies by Kacen Callender


Chinglish: an almost true story by Sue Cheung


Internment by Samira Ahmed

Set in a horrifying near-future America, seventeen-year-old Layla and her parents are forced into an internment camp for Muslim citizens.




Noughts and Crosses by Malorie Blackman


Brown Girl Dreaming by Jacqueline Woodson





This is a brilliant classic about an African American girl growing up in Mississippi in the 1930s.








Stella by starlight by Sharon M. Draper

This is the first of Maya Angelou's five volumes of autobiography, in which she evokes her childhood with her grandmother in the American south of the 1930s. She learns the power of a white skin and suffers the trauma of rape by her mother's lover.

The absolutely true diary of a part-time Indian by Sherman Alexie

This is a heartbreaking, funny, and beautifully written tale, featuring poignant drawings that reflect the character's art and it is based on the author's own experiences. It chronicles contemporary adolescence as seen through the eyes of one Native American boy. *Contains swearing & references to violence*.

A change is gonna come by Various Authors This is a short stories collection featuring top

This is a short stories collection featuring top Young Adult authors and introducing a host of exciting new voices. This anthology of stories and poetry from BAME writers focuses on the theme of change.

A blade so black by L. L. McKinney

Alice finds herself fighting nightmarish monsters both at home in Atlanta and in a dark Wonderland when she is saved from one by the mysterious Hatta.

Frankly in love by David Yoon

Two Korean teenagers living in America pretend to date each other to please their parents, while secretly in love with other people. This is a a poignant & perceptive look at racism & family duty.

NOTE: Strong language throughout and racist comments

A very large expanse of sea by Tahereh Mafi

An American Muslim girl subjected to racist prejudice has to learn to trust people when she meets a boy. This book is Full of heartbreaking emotional depth set against ever-present racism. Its Semi-autobiographical nature gives it real clout and does a great job in wearing down stereotypes. Racist swearing.

Dew Angels by Melanie Schwapp (15+)

Follows the life of a young girl growing up in Jamaica where she deals with racial prejudice from both her family who pride themselves on their light-coloured skin, as well as the wider community she lives in.

NOTE: Contains swearing, domestic violence, marijuana use, gang crime, murder, attempted rape, suicide.


The Underground Railroad by Colson Whitehead


Sing, unburied, sing by Jesmyn Ward (15+)






Beloved by Toni Morrison


Welcome to Nowhere by Elizabeth Laird

Lies we tell ourselves by Robin Talley



The hypnotist by Laurence Anholt


Set in the American Deep South in the 1960s, a black teenager and a University professor experience and fight to overcome extreme racism and the KKK.

NOTE: Some violence and descriptions of racist attacks that may upset sensitive younger readers.



Buffalo soldier by Tanya Landman

Set at the end of the American Civil War, a young black girl disguises herself as a man and joins the army after her friend is raped and lynched by a racist mob. Trapped in a world of injustice and inequality, it's only when Charley is posted to Apache territory that she begins to learn what it is to be truly free.



I am not a number by Lisa Heathfield

Set in an authoritarian future Britain, a teenage girl attempts to free herself and her family from a prison camp for political dissidents. The story highlights the political narratives supported by the Trump administration.

Note: (13+) Not for sensitive readers.



Half bad by Sally Green

A teenage boy who is half white witch and half black witch struggles for survival in a hidden society of witches.

NOTE: Contains strong language, torture and violence.







Follows the lives of boys at a boarding school in 1980s Zimbabwe, focussing on the characteristic politics and racism of the period.

NOTE: There is a lot of hard swearing throughout, and the intrinsic racism and use of derogatory terms



Sisterland by Linda Newberry

An old lady, struggling with Alzheimer's Disease, is forced to face up to her past. Meanwhile, one of her grandaughters becomes aware of the inhumanity and racism around us. Intertwines experience of present-day England with flashbacks to the late 1930s and '40s in continental Europe.



The Help by Kathryn Stockett

The Help recounts the story of a young white journalist Eugenia "Skeeter" Phelan and her relationship with two black maids, Aibileen Clark and Minny Jackson, during the Civil Rights Movement in 1963 Jackson, Mississippi. In an attempt to become a legitimate journalist and writer, Skeeter decides to write a book from the point of view of the maids, exposing the racism they are faced with as they work for white families.



Pigeon English by Stephen Kelman

Follows the life of an 11-year-old Ghanaian boy living in inner city London and his ill-fated mission to find the person who knifed a boy from his school. Note: Contains swearing throughout, incidents of knife crime, gang violence and sexual behaviour.



Rivers of London by Ben Aaronovich

Enter Peter Grant, a Police Constable for the London Metropolitan Police. One dreary night while standing guard at a crime scene a witness approaches him to give a testimony on the murder that happened there the night before. Unfortunately for Peter that witness is himself, also dead, a ghost




Uncle Tom's cabin by Harriet Beecher Stowe

This is the most popular, influential and controversial book written by an American. The novel gave such a terrific impetus to the crusade for the abolition of slavery that President Lincoln half-jokingly greeted Stowe as'the little lady' who started the great Civil War. As Keith Carabine argues in his lively and provocative Introduction, the novel immediately provoked a storm of competing and contradictory responses




Blue/orange by Joe Penhall (Play)
