

Word from the Head

22 September 2023

Dear Parents

This week we held our last two Welcome Evenings for the parents of Years 8 and 9. It was lovely to see you all - and particular thanks to the Year 9 parents who not only braved the weather to get to Channing on Wednesday but then had to brave it again when the fire alarm went off mid-talk!

We have really valued the opportunity to talk to so many of you in person over the first three weeks about new developments at school - the rewards and sanctions system, Yondr and a focus on reading, for example - as well as updating you on the latest research evidence in teaching and learning and the digital world. Most importantly, it has afforded our Heads of Year the chance to tell you more about what you - and we - can expect for and from your child in the year ahead.

I mentioned in my talks that I had recently heard a leading psychologist say that all transitions are essentially identity crises, which I think is very apt, and I was struck that Ms Mohabeer, Head of Year 8, referred to looking forward to 'getting to know the Year 8 version of your children'. She was absolutely right: our pupils, by necessity, reinvent themselves each September as the start of every academic year brings new questions about how we fit in, what interests we have and what we might explore over the coming months.

With that in mind, I really enjoyed sharing some thoughts about continuity and change at Channing in my assembly on Tuesday morning. At the end of the summer term we received the sad news of the death of former Headmistress, Mrs Tatiana Macaire, at the age of 90. She was the seventh Headmistress of Channing, from 1978-84, and, from all I have learned, she was a quite remarkable woman. She was a Classics teacher with a degree in Greats from Oxford and, in keeping with the traditions of the late 1950s, had given up teaching when she married. Instead she accompanied her husband in his career working for Unilever in Africa and the Middle East which, during the 1960s, must have been quite an adventure in itself!

However on their return to England she resumed her teaching career and, as her oldest son put it in his eulogy, it was made clear to the family that 'now it was her turn'. The first married Headmistress of the school, she moved her husband and two prep school-age sons from Hampshire to Highgate to take up the post of Headmistress in the summer of 1978. She inherited a vastly different school to the one I inherited in 2020. In assembly I showed a copy of the whole school photograph of May 1981, which featured 320 girls in the Senior School and 100 in the Junior School - a far cry from the 996 who were captured in the most recent photograph last year!

Mrs Macaire laid the foundations for the Channing we know today - a highly energetic and visionary leader, she remodelled the science labs and created the first ever Sixth Form Centre. She also developed the plans for the building of Brunner House and it was wonderful to share some photographs from the 1980 school prospectus to demonstrate the differences between Channing then and now. However some things are definitely still the same: Founders' Hall, the Art rooms and

the Library, for example, remain their distinctive selves. Mrs Macaire did not stay at Channing very long, moving to Ashford School in Kent in 1984. She served as Headmistress there for 15 years, including a year as President of the Girls' School Association, before her retirement and return to the New Forest.

At Mrs Macaire's funeral I was struck by the sense of continuity between us, both firmly committed to the education of girls and determined to make Channing the best school it can be. I certainly consider myself to be the guardian of the school, holding it in trust from the Headmistresses who came before me and ready to hand it over (one day!) to those who will come after me. As I said to our assembled students on Tuesday, I hope that beyond their immediate day-to-day life in school they might also sometimes consider the thousands of girls who have walked the corridors and sat in the classrooms before them, and those who are still to come. For many of them, that's their mothers, aunts and grandmothers: I love the fact that so many of our current pupils are second and third generation Channing pupils. I have no doubt that many of you reading this will enjoy looking at my assembly slides

Assembly September 2023.pdf. However long your connection to the school, part of you will be Channing forever!

On that note, I leave you this week with an additional thought on the subject of 'mattering'. Over the last three weeks we have introduced you at our Welcome Evening to TooledUp, a fantastic resource to which all Channing parents will have access from 31 October. You may remember that I often mention Dr Kathy Weston and her excellent weekly *Wednesday Wisdom* email: she has great insights about parenting modern teens which I want to share with you. This week's email is absolutely brilliant on the topic of Mistakes and Mattering, and I encourage you to have a read over the weekend. She concludes with this thought:

After all, when you feel heard, seen and valued, you feel unstoppable.

That's certainly what we strive to do and I look forward to what our unstoppable students might achieve this year.

For now, I wish you all a very happy weekend and G'mar hatimah tovah to all those observing Yom Kippur.


STEM News

Marine Biology Club

Anatomy Club

The Anatomy Club started this week with eighteen Year 7 and 8 students. We began with the dissection of a mouse. The students carefully opened the animals and inspected the heart, lungs, liver, kidneys, stomach and intestines. Many students were surprised at the sizes of the different organs: the heart was small, around the size of a pea, but the liver was much larger, comprising a number of segments or lobes. The students were guided by 11 fantastic Sixth Formers who helped identify the different organs.



Next week we will be dissecting a lizard to see how a reptile's anatomy compares to that of a mammal.



To the students who were disappointed not to join this term (enrollment was on a strict first come, first served basis) they are already enrolled on the course for next term, so they will not miss out!

Chemistry RSC Top of the Bench Competition

The Chemistry Department will be "taking" four students to this year's Chilterns and Middlesex Royal Society of Chemistry virtual 'Top of the Bench' competition. The Channing team will comprise two Year 9 students, one Year 10 student and one Year 11 student. Students who have participated in the competition in previous years are not allowed to take part again. Team members will have the opportunity to participate in a challenging competition with ten rounds of questions and chemical problems. Marking will be carried out by members of the Chilterns and Middlesex Royal Society of Chemistry Committee and the winning team is awarded a trophy, receives a cash prize and will represent the Chilterns and Middlesex Section of the Royal Society of Chemistry at the National Top of the Bench Final. The runners-up also receive prizes. The competition will be held after school on Wednesday 8 November (finishing at around 5:30 pm) and will run virtually. The students will remain at Channing and will participate in the competition via a Zoom link and will be provided with drinks and snacks. If your child is interested in taking part in the competition, then please ask them to register their interest using the Google Form on their Chemistry Google Classroom. If there's enough interest then we might be able to enter more than one team.

Biology Biodiversity Field trip

On Thursday 14 September, Year 12 Biology students went on a field trip to Epping Forest to investigate biodiversity. In the morning, we focused on the biodiversity in freshwater. We used nets to collect samples from the pond in order to look for invertebrates that were living there. We found a variety of biological organisms including water snails, newts and a dragonfly nymph. We even caught a fish! After a close call with a potential swim with the frogs, we had collected all of our data. We went back to the field centre and recorded the biodiversity levels using the Simpson's index of diversity. We had lunch and then got right back out to the forest where we were now measuring the diversity of terrestrial invertebrates. This time we were using nets to sweep through two sites (grassland and woodland) in order to discover the richness and evenness of a selection of



species. After a few scares with spiders, we made our way back to the field centre and, again, collected our data using the same diversity index. Once we had completed this, it was time to thank the field centre staff and make our way home. We would like to say a huge thank you to Mr Frank and Ms Hillier for taking on this enriching trip.

Maths News



Maths clubs have started this week. Puzzle club started on Monday where Sixth Formers were playing strategy games with Year 7 and 8 students. They made origami puzzles, played giant connect 4 games and 3D wooden challenges. Other Maths/STEM clubs starting this week were chess club and Mathletics.

In Mathletics Mrs Williams is putting our quickest Mathematicians through their paces as they are preparing to compete against

On Thursday 21 September, the Year 11 geographers carried out a study of Loughton Brook, examining the geology of the source along with how the river characteristics change along its course.

The students worked in the field centre before going outside to follow the course of the river and take accurate enough measurements to show that the river profile changed in accordance with the Bradshaw model. Fortunately they were able to do all this work without any rain!
