

Word from the Head

26 January 2024

Dear Parents

This week's Word from the Head will be somewhat shorter than usual and also rather more serious than usual. It's rare for us to have the police in school, and to have had contact with them twice in a week is unheard of, so I am sure you will understand why I want to write about this unusual situation.

At the end of last term I updated you all on the investigation into the terrible incident of antisemitic graffiti which was found in the week after October half term. Having spent countless hours reviewing CCTV footage and interviewing students, the police told us in the last week of term that we had exhausted all reasonable lines of enquiry at present but added that if new information were to come to light, they would help us follow this up immediately. They, and the CST, commended us for being proactive and engaged, actively looking for support and advice and following up every lead.

The police felt that the investigation was now a safeguarding issue and that the focus should be on education. As a result PC Bell and Sergeant Lawton of the Haringey Safer Schools team came to assembly on Tuesday this week to highlight that this behaviour was not just a hate crime but also criminal damage, and completely unacceptable. They emphasised that while the internal investigation into this incident had come to a halt, any future incidents of this nature would be taken most seriously and acted on by them, rather than by the school.

They also introduced students to the concept of 'joint enterprise', explaining that in law bystanders who witness crimes, and those who are aware of crimes being perpetrated, have a responsibility to speak as they can be held equally responsible for those crimes. I know that our students are more often upstanders than bystanders, and are usually good at telling us when they see crimes taking place in the wider Highgate community. We've been able to support girls who have reported having belongings taken from them or who have suffered unwanted attention on the streets, for example. As I said in assembly, I can only hope that our students would use the same moral compass on crimes in school as they would beyond our gates.

Of course we are continuing our efforts to educate the whole school community on the dangers of discrimination and the importance of our Unitarian values of kindness, respect and tolerance. A comprehensive education programme designed to educate and inform students on the situation in the Middle East and the dangers of all forms of discrimination, including antisemitism, is well underway and embedded in the curriculum for future years.

One event we have always observed at Channing is Holocaust Memorial Day, which this year falls tomorrow, on 27 January. To mark this important occasion the History Department led assembly this morning, with Sixth Form students presenting on this year's theme, the fragility of freedom. We partnered with the Holocaust Educational Trust, who provided an incredibly

moving video with testimonials and thoughts from several survivors that was shared with the school. It is relatively rare for me to be brought to tears by assembly but this certainly touched me deeply, and there were many other staff and students who were visibly moved. One of the survivors who featured in the video, Manfred Goldberg BEM, will be visiting Channing on Monday to do a workshop on antisemitism and the Holocaust with our Sixth Form students. Next week and throughout the term clubs and lessons in KS3 and KS4 will cover the Holocaust as well. Our huge thanks to both the Holocaust Educational Trust and Holocaust Learning UK for their participation and assistance in this years' commemoration.

Having had the police in school on Tuesday morning, and expressed my hope that Channing students would be upstanders rather than bystanders, you can imagine how appalled I was on Tuesday afternoon to learn that the police had been informed of possible thefts by Channing students outside school. We were horrified to hear that the store manager of Space NK in Muswell Hill had had to report to the police that girls wearing Channing uniform and kit had been shoplifting from the branch.

It transpires that there is a TikTok craze in which young people are targeting beauty retailers such as Space NK and Sephora. They are stealing products from the boxes and putting the empty boxes back on the shelf, filming this and posting the videos on TikTok, where it is referred to as 'borrowing'. Groups of three or four young people, ranging in age from as young as 10 to as old as 16, come into the store at the same time, usually on Friday afternoon or at the weekend, and huddle together to carry this out. The particular targets are beauty products from the Rare Beauty range by Selena Gomez. In this case the store has passed their CCTV footage, which shows girls wearing Channing uniform, to the police, and we have made clear that we will engage fully in any police investigation.

In the meantime, I wonder whether this weekend you might help your children explore the moral compass by which they - and their friends - are operating. When they see poor behaviour, ranging from low level disruption in class to acts which might be criminal offences in and beyond school, what are their instincts? Do they perceive barriers to doing the right thing, in being upstanders rather than bystanders? Are there occasions where loyalty to one's friends is more important than acting for the common good of our whole community? I have no doubt that we can all remember incidents from our childhoods and teenage years where our moral courage was tested and it was hard to separate right from wrong. We all know the power of peer pressure and the fear of being seen as a snitch, for example. This article from TooledUp provides some useful conversation starters about values - I particularly like questions I-20 in relation to the issues we have dealt with in school over the last few months. 

This week the topic was Hypnosis, which gave pupils insight into how the use of hypnosis can be far more important in the treatment of certain conditions beyond simple entertainment.








Cooking at St Aloysius
