



Dear Parents,

Welcome back, and I hope you had a good break over the holiday. I certainly did, and have returned to school with a renewed sense of optimism for the term ahead. It helps that I really love the summer term! With the glimpses of sunshine, green leaves and blossoms around the school site, I love the promise of warmth and long days to come. There is a sense of anticipation that anything is possible - and, in just 11 weeks, the prospect of the long summer holiday. However there is masses to pack in before we get there, and I am also looking forward to the hard work, activities, trips, performances and sporting endeavours which will fill all our lives over the coming months.

Of course for our Year 11 and Year 13 students this term is bittersweet. Their GCSE and A level exams start in a couple of weeks, and indeed this week the A level Art exam and some of the A level and IGCSE language orals have been taking place. While there is certainly nervous anticipation of the exams, they are also the culmination of everything our students have been working towards for the last 18 months and I know they are focused and prepared to do their best. For Year 13 this will also be the term they say goodbye to Channing, and I am looking forward to celebrating their achievements with the school and their parents on 2 May. Both Year 13 and Year 11 will get a fantastic send-off before their study leave begins!

It seems slightly counterintuitive that these farewells are part of what binds our community together. There is something very special about acknowledging publicly the journey of these students through the school and wishing them well as they step out of our world and into a new one which they will make their own. I wanted to start the term by reminding the school about the responsibilities we have as members of our community, and regular readers of Word from the Head may remember that I talked about this a couple of weeks before the end of last term when I discussed the way in which social norms are changing and people do - or, indeed, don't do - things which would have been considered entirely unacceptable five or ten years ago.

I mentioned then that the Bursar made the analogy of dog mess, and (somewhat to the surprise of the gathered Senior school) that's where I started in assembly on Tuesday morning. The many dog owners among the students were adamant that they always carry a supply of poo bags with them and I was delighted to hear it, not least as it's a legal requirement since 1996 that dog owners pick up after their dog. However, we know that the streets of London are no longer as clean as they were and that more and more owners are flouting the law (and common decency) by not picking up after their pooch.

Why does it matter? Because the little things are important. I delved into a bit of A level Psychology and shared the concept of the Broken Window Theory, posited in 1982 by social scientists James Wilson and George Kelling, building on earlier work by Stanford University psychologist Philip Zimbardo. This is best summarised as "One unrepaired broken window is a signal that no one cares, and so breaking more windows costs nothing." (I have discovered subsequently that this was an important concept for Year 9 in considering urban regeneration in King's Cross on their field trip yesterday too.)

As I said to the school, we don't break windows at Channing, but there are little things we do every day in how we behave and how we dress which matter and which are part of our social contract as a community. I explained that the social contract is an idea which philosophers have considered over thousands of years, from Socrates to Jean-Jacques Rousseau to John Locke. The theory suggests that there are universal, or unwritten, laws, as well as written rules, which govern how humans behave harmoniously together in society. We give up some of our rights to freedom of action and expression in order to be part of an organised and beneficial whole.

My old Head used to say, "stick to your knitting", in other words, focus on getting the basics right. This term I want our pupils to focus on getting the basics right by observing the Four Non-Negotiables,

- Arrive to lessons on time
- Be ready to learn
- Maintain a high standard of behaviour in lessons
- End lessons well

and by dressing right, particularly in their choice of earrings and other jewellery, PE kit (especially ensuring these are Channing branded or plain black bottoms) and suitable footwear. I made the point that these are active choices - they don't have to pick up their eye liner or put on hoop earrings when they are getting ready for school - and I would be grateful for your support in helping them make the right ones.

Finally - my own personal bugbear - chewing gum! I cannot bear chewing gum: a) it gets everywhere and is deeply unpleasant for our cleaners and estates team to have to deal with when it is discarded and b) I hate how stupid it makes people look to walk around chewing, like cows with their cud. It gets an instant demerit and it shouldn't be brought into school. Rant over!

Channing has both a written and unwritten social contract. I think our community is something really precious and special, and I finished the assembly by explaining that when people make the choice to act outside our social contract they send a message that they don't care about the community and don't want to be part of it. It requires all of us to play our part in upholding it because when we stop acting for the greater good in our individual lives then society as a whole can only be the worse for it. Stick to your knitting instead.

Tuesday's assembly was also the opportunity for me to welcome (and welcome back) a number of staff. Mrs Tomback returns as Head of Sixth Form and a History teacher after her maternity leave, and Ms Kung returns from her sabbatical with a slightly amended job role and new title of Director of Social Impact, as well as teaching History. The new role will include her work on partnerships as well as a wider brief relating to all of our community involvement. As a result of her role change Ms Wilberforce becomes Head of Careers and Higher Education and Mr Raine is Overseas University Applications Coordinator, as they take on parts of Ms Kung's previous HE role.

With Mr Waring already well underway in his new role in Madrid, I am delighted that Ms Pavlopoulos, Head of German, takes up the additional role of Head of MFL, and Ms Gomez will be Acting Head of Spanish this term. Congratulations to them both. We also have two part time supply teachers joining the MFL department this term: Ms Stavena returns to us in French and Ms Ogunseitan will be working in the Spanish department.

We also welcome Miss Hawker, our new Senior School SENCO who will work with Mrs Gardiner in our SEND department, and Mr Gibb who joins us as a part time VMS viola teacher while Miss

Newman-Pond is on maternity leave. Congratulations to all on their new roles, and I hope that our new staff will be very happy in the Channing community.

Lastly in staff news, congratulations to Mr Meier and his wife on the safe arrival of their baby girl who was born in the last week of the holiday. All are well, and Mr Meier is on paternity leave for the first two weeks of term. In his absence, Mrs Bhamra-Burgess, Mr Gittins and I will cover his role. Please contact Mrs Bhamra-Burgess for Senior School safeguarding issues and day-to-day issues of school routines and Mr Gittins for pastoral matters; he will be working with the Heads of Year on pastoral care, behaviour, rewards and sanctions.

There is one more piece of congratulations to share with you today. Over the holidays I have reflected at length on a decision I made to rescind an appointment to the Officer team before it was announced in Mark Reading on the last day of term. I realise that, on balance, this was a mistake and I am pleased to have had the chance to rectify it. As such I was delighted to announce in assembly this morning that Zoe Quartey is joining the existing 2024-25 Officer team as a Sixth Form Officer, effective immediately.

May I take this opportunity to say *Chag Pesach sameach* to our Jewish families observing this important holiday over the coming two weeks. Details of lunch provision for your daughters are in the first section below, and I wish you a peaceful and prosperous Passover.

# Notices

## Catering for Pupils Observing Passover

We are writing to you ahead of Passover this year which takes place 22 to 30 April inclusive so that we can ensure we offer the best possible provision for those observing the festival. We know that we have a significant number of Jewish families at Channing and understand that students will observe Passover differently. This brief guidance aims to ensure everyone's needs are catered for in the spirit of our Unitarian ethos of kindness, tolerance and inclusivity.

We cannot provide kosher for Passover meals in the Dining Room, so as we have done in previous years we will again make provision for a separate lunch room to be made available from Tuesday 23 April for those who do not wish to eat chametz (leavened food products) during Passover. The designated lunch room will be supervised by a member of staff each day.

Students will be allowed during the above dates only to bring in their own food for lunch, as long as it meets the following guidelines:

- Under no circumstances are any nuts, or any products containing nuts, to be brought into the school
- The food brought in should remain healthy and nutritious so that students can maintain concentration in their afternoon lessons - no junk food will be allowed
- The food brought in should show consideration for others and for the fact that the room provided is a classroom - please avoid bringing in food with a strong odour
- All food brought in for Passover must be consumed in the designated room - sanctions will be issued for students eating elsewhere
- Students must provide their own cutlery (where needed), and must clean up after themselves each day

If you have any questions about the provision for Passover, please do contact the School Office.

Following on from Mrs Hughes' comments about the social contract we all follow as part of the Channing Community, can we remind you to be respectful of each other and our neighbours when you are dropping off and picking up at Channing? 

superb vocal solos from Evie M, Leili A, Ruby D, Martha R, Georgie G, and Beatrice McN, who was accompanied on piano by Amber J.



## STEM News




### Channing School of Witchcraft and Wizardry (Years 7 and 8)
