
The eighth candle, the shamash (Hebrew for leader) burned brighter than the rest, its steady flame sounding proudly above the others, as if it were a guardian of the light above the rest of the candles flickering below. Around a table, sat a small family, their faces full of happiness. They all sang in unison, as sweet as a bird singing a bedtime story to its children. On the table there were doughnuts, latkes, rugelach and roasted chicken with roasted carrots; it looked like a massive feast with the family laughing, singing and enjoying themselves, which could make anyone smile and feel warm inside.

The children were sitting at the table sipping spinning a dreidel for gelt (chocolate and sweets), the letters were such, nun, gimel, hay and finally shin. The children would be shouting 'no', 'I won' or 'yes'. The letters on the dreidel stood for Nes Gadol Hayah Sham, which in English translates as 'a great miracle happened there' and that is what Chanukah is centered around.

Still, the outside world remained silent, the streets empty of noise, whilst snow fell gently onto the earth. But here, within this modest household, there was warmth that could not be extinguished by the frost of the season, nor the weight of the years, and that is the feeling of Chanukah, warm and welcoming.

History of Art News
