

# Word from the Head

24 January 2025

#### Dear Parents,

On Tuesday morning our assembly was taken by Daisy Bessell, Fundraising & Marketing Officer for Women for Women International, our chosen Senior School charity for the year. Since 1993, Women for Women International has invested in the power of over half a million women across 17 conflict-affected countries. From Afghanistan and Iraq to Nigeria and the Democratic Republic of Congo, they invest where inequality is greatest by helping women who are the survivors of war and conflict.

The charity was founded thirty years ago in response to the Bosnian War, in which over 50,000 women were subjected to sexual violence as a weapon of war. Thousands more witnessed the killing of loved ones and destruction of their homes, and were left struggling to provide and care for their families whilst dealing with severe trauma. Survivors said that they felt invisible, that the world had forgotten about them, that no one cared. This experience is mirrored in the lives of women in all the conflict-affected countries where Women for Women International work.

Daisy explained that the charity believes that empowering women creates a ripple effect of change, breaking cycles of poverty and rebuilding communities. She outlined the four key programmes they run. The core Stronger Women, Stronger Nations programme provides women affected by war with the tools, knowledge, and support they need to transform their lives. The Change Agents programme, launched in 2017, equips women with leadership and advocacy skills, enabling them to address challenges in their communities, work with local leaders, and create systemic change.

In addition the Men's Engagement Programme educates husbands, male relatives and community leaders on gender equality and women's rights. By challenging harmful norms, this initiative fosters healthier households and stronger communities. Finally the Adolescent Girls Programme equips girls with essential life skills, focusing on gender equality, health and wellness, financial literacy, and safety. By addressing the unique challenges they face - poverty, lack of education, and gender-based violence - we empower them to take charge of their futures.

It was fantastic to see where the money we are raising this year will go. Just £264 will pay for one woman to complete the Stronger Women, Stronger Nations programme and, given that we anticipate raising several thousand pounds this year, I am excited to think how many women will be empowered by the support of Channing girls. This impact will be further augmented by our participation in #MessageToMySister, where we are invited to send a message of hope and solidarity to a woman survivor of war. Our messages will remind her she's not alone - that someone, somewhere, believes in her strength and her ability to rebuild her life. That is the power of women, for women.

A focus on our support of others is a key part of our Unitarian ethos, and our commitment to community service and charity work is something of which I am really proud. Indeed social impact is a key pillar of our vision for Channing 2035. It struck a real chord, then, when I read David Brooks' article, The Character-Building Tool Kit, in the New York Times. I particularly enjoyed this section:

The schools that focus on moral education ... have a sense of moral mission, that who you become is more important than what career track you pursue. ... They have a clear goal and everybody knows their role in achieving it. They have rituals to mark transitions. They have retreats and group travel so that people can see one another before the makeup goes on. They provide opportunities for struggle and growth. They often have sacred symbols and initiation rituals so that everybody knows they belong.

Next week provides just one of those opportunities: it's Year 8's Charity Week and each House will be putting on events with a birthday theme, to coincide with our 140th anniversary on Tuesday. I hear talk of a massive game of Musical Chairs, party food for lunch on Tuesday and a slumber party-themed home clothes day on Friday. These communal events are what bond us as a community and I look forward to the week-long Channing party (I have bought a new pair of pyjamas specially!).

Further to last week's launch of our strategic objectives for Channing 2035, I am delighted to invite you to contribute to discussions about how to bring these objectives to life. This will be in the form of World Café-style facilitated sessions looking at what you love about Channing, what you dislike, what you think we should change and what you think we should create. Senior School parents should click on this link to book their place. For Junior School parents please use this link. Places are limited so if you'd like to participate I would suggest you book as soon as possible.

Finally this week a reminder that no girl should be on site before 7.30am, please. None of our extracurricular activities start before that time and the breakfast club opens at 7.30am too. We cannot offer supervision of your child before that time. Most importantly though, we want to ensure that all children arrive safely in school, especially during the darker months. ### **Invitation - Join Channing Community Choir!**



# Performance Anxiety: A Tooled up resource recommended by the LAMDA Department

Everyone Gets Stage Fright: A Chat with Dr Anna Colton

Stage fright, otherwise known as performance anxiety, can affect anyone, not just actors and performers. It happens ahead of many different kinds of tasks and impacts most people. Whether it's worrying about going on stage, feeling anxious about giving a presentation, nerves before a test or about going to a party or talking to someone in a shop or restaurant. Everyone's stage is different and everyone's anxiety is activated by different stimuli!

In this webinar, clinical psychologist, Dr Anna Colton, talks us through the biology and psychology of performance anxiety, exploring how universal and ordinary this experience is. She then provides numerous, practical strategies that can help children, young people and adults. This webinar is great for parents and can be watched with young people themselves.

It is always so heartening to see that the most frequent comment by students in the LAMDA Course Evaluations is the excitement at the confidence they have developed that they will use in all future arenas even 'Just speaking up in class'. A Sixth Former who was presenter for her team,

# **History of Art News**

Last Thursday, the Year 13 Art History students went to the Royal Academy and the National Gallery. At the RA, we visited an exhibition on Michelangelo, Raphael and Da Vinci, which included

their preparatory sketches and studies which would have been used for their masterpieces.

Michelangelo stood out as particularly impressive because of his attention to anatomical detail seen in the musculature of his figures. We also looked at some artworks in the RA's permanent collection, consisting of paintings in the Neoclassical tradition and copies of classical sculptures such as the 'Laocoon and his Sons'. After lunch, we went to the National gallery and looked at some Impressionist works by Monet, as well as those by Cezanne and other Post/Neo-Impressionist artists. Despite some of the rooms in the National Gallery being closed, we discussed the artworks on view and how they influenced the works in the 'Modernism' topic we are currently studying.

## **History News**

#### **Holocaust Survivor Paula Zeff**

On Monday the History Department hosted two speakers from the Holocaust Educational Trust as part of a wider programme marking Holocaust Memorial Day 2025. Dr Jaime Ashworth spoke on the historical roots of the Holocaust and survivor Paula Zeff shared her story with the Sixth Form. The testimony was followed by a question and answer session to enable students to better understand the nature of the Holocaust and to explore its lessons in more depth. The visit is part of the Holocaust Educational Trust's extensive all year round Outreach Programme.

Paula was born in September 1939 in Rotterdam, Holland. Her father was a refugee from Nazi Germany and her mother lived in Holland but was originally from Belgium. They met and married in Amsterdam in 1937. When Paula was 2 and a half, her parents felt that life in Nazi occupied Holland had become very dangerous for Jews and they attempted to escape to Switzerland. They went on their own at first and then planned to send for Paula and her grandmother. That was the last anyone heard of them. Paula learned, after the war, that they had been captured at the Swiss border and deported to Auschwitz-Birkenau where they were murdered. Paula was saved by the kindness of a local church who hid her through the duration of the war.

#### **Maths Problem Solving Club**

This started on Wednesday with Saskia and Yael in Year 12 working with 10 students from Highgate Primary school and Channing Junior School. We were impressed how quick they all were completing a times table challenge in their warm up. Then Mrs Wootton introduced the frog investigation in a practical way with the students representing the different coloured frogs and they had to solve the strategy problem.

They then replicated the game and solved it in pairs discovering the pattern contained square numbers and realising that algebra is everywhere! Here they are solving the problem, hard at work!

#### **Anatomy Club**

The Anatomy Club restarted this term with the dissection of a sheep's heart. Again the Year 12s were on hand to guide the students. The pupils explored the heart's four chambers, and also compared the size of the left ventricle with the right ventricle. They then examined the valves between the atria and the ventricles. Finally the students carefully made some slides from the heart muscle to inspect under a microscope, cutting the muscle tissue as thinly as possible. Next week, we will dissect a sheep's eye. #### **Author Visit: Tamsin Winter**

The author Tamsin Winter visited Channing on Tuesday 21 January to run a creative writing



workshop for Year 7 and talk to Year 8 about her books and career. She also had lunch with the pupil librarians. Tamsin spoke about her journey to becoming an author, which started with some mixed feedback from her primary school teacher on her work ('This is nonsense!'). However, Tamsin persevered and went on to study Creative Writing at university and become an English teacher and after a lot of hard work (we saw the stacks of typescripts for *Bad Influence*) she finished her first novel, *Being Miss Nobody*. She has now published four books and a new one - *I Dare You* - will be published in May.

Tamsin spoke about her four novels, which feature girls in their early teens struggling with the ups and downs of school, relationships, social media and more. Tamsin's protagonists show courage and determination to overcome their problems, and the books are full of empathy and humour.
