



Dear Parents,

As we reach the end of a long and busy half term I want to congratulate our fantastic pupils and staff on all that they have achieved since the New Year. For Years 11 and 13 this afternoon marks the end of their mock exam fortnight - certainly a huge achievement, and I congratulate them for their exemplary approach to this important practice - but in every year group and for every individual, there will be a success or high point on which they can reflect.

I have written before on the tendency of our pupils - in common with many of their peers - to focus on the negatives, on what has been left undone, on their perceived failures. You will also have heard me saying that I want our pupils to develop two key characteristics: firstly, an understanding of their own strengths and the ability to celebrate them; to acknowledge praise and accept compliments. I love quoting Caitlin Moran's suggestion that girls should learn to accept compliments in just the same way they might catch a rounder's ball. In fact I highly recommend you read [the article](#) from The Times in which she first wrote about this back in 2016. Our girls are quick to brush off praise or achievement as luck or a fluke - no, it's not. It's not boastful to blow your own trumpet, it's entirely right to take pride in a job well done. I want them to be able to say, I'm good at this, I do this well.

Conversely I also want them to practice self compassion. You will know as much as I do that your child can be prone to beating themselves up when things go wrong and are sometimes really hard on themselves. But they are brilliant friends, and will be the first to say 'You're great, it's just a blip, you'll do better next time' when something goes wrong for someone else. I want them to be as kind to themselves as they are to others about the things they can't do so well and be happy to live with those imperfections. It may sound obvious, but it's not always explained explicitly or taught to our children. Certainly it's something I took a long time to learn, and have struggled with again just this week. I believe that our warm support - and appropriate challenge - of our pupils, along with the exhortation to be 10% braver, enables them to develop this important attribute.

I was delighted that this approach was recognised by the reviewer from the Good Schools Guide when she visited earlier this term. The Junior and Senior School have been given glowing reviews which are now live [on the Channing website](#). Both reviews emphasised our strong sense of community, inclusivity and pastoral care. I was also delighted to see the reviewer's comment that "'Fearless' teaching and learning, encouraging girls to step out of their comfort zone and be '10 per cent braver', is reaping academic rewards." These independent and comprehensive reviews really affirm our mission to ensure girls are empowered to become kind, confident, articulate young women who are ready for life's challenges. As one parent shared with the Good Schools Guide: "We couldn't have given them a better start" (thank you, whoever you are!).

This community spirit is based on our Unitarian heritage and I wanted to reiterate Mr Meier's invitation from last week to consider hosting Kincső Balázs-Blénessi-Pataki, our 2025 Transylvanian scholar from the János Zsigmond Unitarian College in Kolozsvár (Cluj), for her 6 week stay in London for the first half of the Autumn term. that previous visiting scholars have found their experience at Channing and in London to be life-changing and look forward to continuing this important tradition.

Finally this week, and on a slightly different note, Tuesday this week was Safer Internet Day. The theme this year was '*Too Good To Be True*' which got students looking at the real scale of scams online and allowed them to share their experiences and ideas on how to tackle the problem. Years 7 and 8 attended a special assembly delivered by our Director of Digital Learning and Technology, Mr Grossman. The assembly explored the crucial role they as young people have to play in keeping themselves and their families informed and safe from scams. Students had the opportunity to discuss how they would advise an older family member who had received a suspicious text message, and found out about more recent evolutions and techniques scammers are using involving AI and deep fakes.

Mr Grossman invited Years 7 and 8 to join him in helping keep the Channing community safe online by signing up to join the newly-launched Student Technology Experts (STExP) group. Students are invited to complete a short Google Form (posted on their Google Classrooms) to express their interest and explain why they would like to join the group and help others. Whilst Year 7 and 8 were in assembly, the other year groups were in form time participating in tailored activities designed to get them thinking hard about scams and online safety. Year 9 spent form time [looking at the potential dangers of 'sextortion' scams](#), and how best to identify them, prevent them and report them. Year 10 also touched on 'sextortion' scams, but [focused as well on 'romance' scams](#) and how they can be spotted and stopped. Year 12 looked at a range of different scams including ['romance' scams and 'impersonation' scams](#), and how best to deal with the different types of scam out there. I give my grateful thanks to Mr Raine, the Head of History, who has organised and is leading our first ever US Southern States A Level History & Politics Trip to Atlanta, Birmingham and New Orleans. It promises to be fascinating and I have no doubt that he, the students and the team of staff accompanying the trip will have an amazing time. I can't wait to hear all about it!

My warmest wishes also to our Muslim families who celebrated the night of Shab-e-Barat last night. I know that you will be preparing for Ramadan which starts on the Friday night after we return from half term. Please don't forget to let Mr Meier know if your child is planning to fast by contacting his assistant Ms Matharu (skaur@channing.co.uk), so teachers can be mindful of their needs.

Careers help needed for Year 12 Springboard Day!

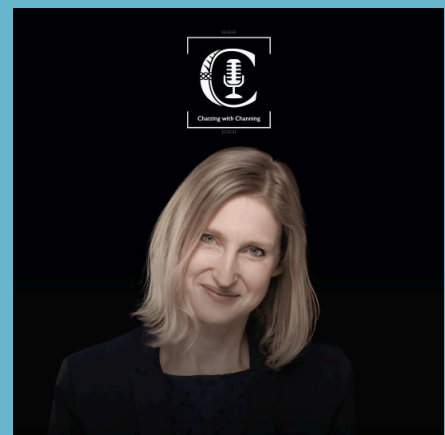

Year 12 Historians chat with Professor Tracy Borman

The latest episode of Chatting with Channing welcomes a distinguished guest, Professor Tracy Borman, leading historian, author, and Chief Executive of the Heritage Education Trust. Interviewed by Year 12 history students Ariella and Opal, Professor Borman takes listeners on a fascinating journey through her career, sharing how her love for history was first sparked by her A-level teacher, Mrs Jones. From classroom inspiration to overseeing some of Britain's most historic sites, including the Tower of London and Hampton Court Palace, her story highlights the power of passionate teaching and perseverance.



A key focus of the discussion is the role of women in history, particularly those who shaped the life and reign of Elizabeth I. Professor Borman reflects on figures such as Blanche Parry, Elizabeth's devoted nurse, and Lettice Knollys, a rival at court, emphasising how these lesser-known women played pivotal roles behind the scenes. She also encourages young historians to explore figures beyond the well-documented kings and queens to gain a fuller understanding of the past.

With insights on Tudor intrigue, advice for aspiring historians, and reflections on why history remains crucial in today's world, this episode is a must-listen for anyone passionate about the past. 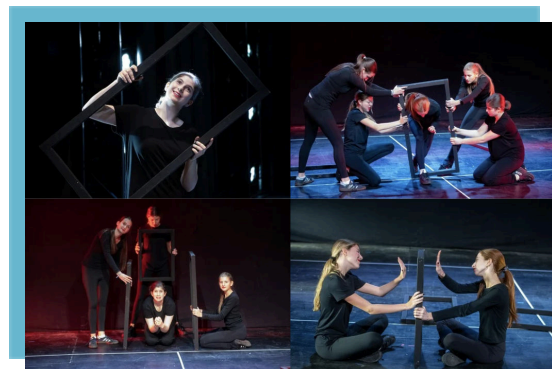

Year 12 Drama & Theatre Performance

Year 12 Drama & Theatre Studies students performed extracts from 3 plays last week. Pictured here is 'Adult Child/Dead Child' by Claire Dowie, a stream of consciousness monologue about an imaginary friend and a difficult family. Performers adopted the 'Total Theatre'



techniques of Steven Berkoff, to stage this powerful and thought provoking piece on mental ill health in childhood. Students also interpreted key scenes from psychological thriller 'The Wasp' by Morgan Lloyd Malcolm and Alexandra Wood's play exploring the deep and unruly waters of sisterhood, 'The Tyler Sisters'.

Theatre Design Workshops

Students have embraced a variety of creative roles behind the scenes in the theatre this week both during the KS3 production rehearsals and in a series of extra curricular Theatre Design workshops.

The backstage team of 'Daisy Pulls it Off' have been working as wardrobe supervisors and scenic artists conducting costume fittings and painting backdrops and flats.



KS4 students have been developing skills essential to the role of a set designer. They have shown great dedication and attention to detail creating accurate 1:25 scale models of their chosen 3m by 3m interior.

KS3 students experimented with SFX makeup techniques to create gruesome effects including broken glass stuck in wounds, broken bones protruding out of fingers, painful looking bruises and pus filled boils.

The enthusiasm, effort and outcomes of all the girls have been outstanding!

Our walk to the Tate Modern provided some great photo opportunities and students spent another couple of hours exploring the architecture and collection of the Tate. We

Problem Solving

This week the problem solvers worked in pairs to solve a logic problem about colourful clowns. They had to use a range of clues to find out where each clown was in a lineup and what colour hat, shoes, hair and nose they each had. By the end of the session they had all managed to figure out the order of the clowns and their colourful outfits.

STEM News

Anatomy Club

This week the students dissected a frog. As usual, this began with an external inspection, examining the mouth, tongue and teeth, eyes and eyelids and nostrils. The tongue is attached to the front of the mouth in order to flick it out and catch prey.



Next the muscles in the frogs legs were viewed by carefully removing the skin. These muscles are very large and muscle contraction can be mimicked by squeezing a muscle, causing the limb to move. Finally a large dissection was made down the front of the frog revealing the internal organs. The liver is very large and composed of three lobes. In the centre of this is the heart. The students were also able to track how food would pass through the animal from the stomach, small then large intestine and rectum. After half term, we will be dissecting a mouse, our first mammal. Python Coding Club

The Computer Science department is running two python coding clubs, one for beginners and the other for advanced programmers. The pupils in both clubs have been creating basic games and simulations in Python. The pupils are now working on creating their designs for more complex games.

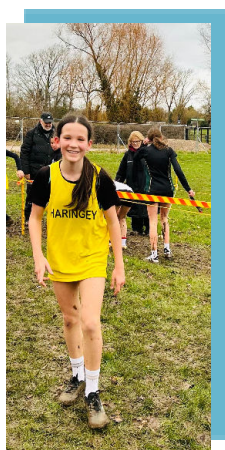

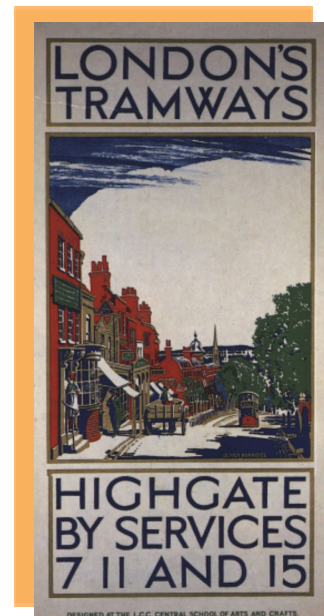


Cross Country
